
February 19 - *“The Third Reconstruction”*

Drew's Views



This past month, as I was reflecting on my 2016, I realized that February marks my six-month anniversary of serving as your minister. As I reflect on the time spent serving UUSB, I feel very happy and lucky to have been selected as your settled minister. Already, in our short time together, we have been through a lot: a crazy presidential election season, many wonderful Sunday worship services, Apple Chapel with the kids down in RE, a couple Social Justice Committee mini-retreats, many other meetings (and let not forget the potlucks...).

I've been thinking a lot about UUSB lately, as we prepare to head into February and as we prepare for our financial stewardship campaign for 2017. It's a time when, just like all of you, I sit down and reflect on the importance that UUSB plays in my life and then, through a complicated thought and heart process, come up with an amount that I am willing to pledge to UUSB for next year's budget. This is not an easy task, and it's a responsibility that I consider very important.

One of the things that I've learned in my short life as a minister is that, for many people, talking about money is hard. In some ways, talking about money is something that people feel guarded about because in our market driven society, based on the Protestant work ethic, people are often tempted to judge themselves against their net worth. This is not helpful. What IS helpful is reflecting about money through the lens of our UU Principles that ignore the concept of financial worth and instead focuses on inherent worth, meaning that we are all of value in both a literal and figurative sense.

The bigger question is how do we support our beloved UUSB community so that we are adequately funding our worship, religious education, music, social justice, and infrastructure ministries. When I look around at the amount of time and talent that our members and friends contribute to UUSB, we are truly a wealthy congregation. Our challenge is to be equally generous with our financial support as well.

This year the Financial Stewardship Committee will be asking people for a modest increase of about three percent in our pledges, which is an amount that we think is achievable and sustainable. Even with this increase and with careful budgeting, we are looking at a deficit budget of approximately \$16K. If not raised by pledges, we will all have to raise these funds through new fundraisers, a reduction in spending—or both. It is for this reason we are offering several incentives to entice people to increase their pledge by more than three percent (for more information, please read the Financial Stewardship column in this issue of *Chalice & Chimes*).

Personally, as I reflected on what I wanted to contribute this year, I thought about how blessed I feel in being called to serve such an amazing congregation. Knowing that there are people in our congregation who might not be able to give as much as they would like, I would like to give a little extra. I also factored in an element of my desire to see our congregation not just survive but to grow and THRIVE! We are playing an increasingly larger role in our Bangor community, as witnessed by the large number of visitors that we have been receiving this fall.

So, when you receive your pledge packet in the mail, I urge you to set aside some time to reflect by yourself, with a loved one, or at one of the wonderful potlucks our Financial Stewardship Committee has planned. Then, make a commitment that speaks to your love of this congregation and your ability give financially. I believe that together we will achieve our goal and be strengthened by our commitment to one another.

We do indeed live in interesting times! Our faith community is a key part of our future, for those who are already active in our church and for those who have yet to find us. On Saturday, February 11, 2017, we will be kicking off our 2017-2018 Pledge Drive with a variety show from 6:00 to 8:00 pm ... mark your calendars! With our wonderful new minister, Drew Moeller, guiding us, there is excitement in the air. Now is the time to start considering your financial support of our incredible church.

You are familiar with the inspiring sermons, soul-feeding music, and vibrant Religious Education classes that are offered at UUSB each week. And then there are the many programs and services we provide, such as our Bean Suppers, Bag Lunches, Soup Kitchen, and gleaning at Farmer's Markets. Our youth group is preparing for a second trip to Guatemala to work with the Safe Passages program. The Tuesday night Coffee House is a new and wonderful opportunity to gather and enjoy music together and invite newcomers to learn more about us. And there is more we could be doing ... what would that be for you?

In the coming year, we will be reviewing and updating our current Strategic Plan. As part of the Pledge Drive, we will be holding House Parties to begin those discussions. What is important to you about Our Faith? Our Future? Our Times? How can we be our best UU selves at UUSB and in the larger community, here in Maine and elsewhere? You are invited to join one of the gatherings to be held the evenings of February 13, 15, and 17, the afternoon of February 16, and after service on March 5

(child care will be provided on March 5). Sign-up will begin soon. Please join us; your voice is important and valued!

Our 2017-2018 Pledge goal is \$123,000. We are asking that each of us consider increasing our current pledge by at least three percent. For example, if you are pledging \$1000, that would be a \$300 increase ... from about \$20 per week, to about \$25 per week. And this year we will be offering some special incentives for those who are able to increase their current pledge by at least five percent, including a very generous matching pledge challenge ... check out the details on the next page of this newsletter! Brochures and pledge cards will be mailed and emailed in early February. We will start collecting pledge cards at the House Parties and will wrap it all up on March 19, to give Council and the Budget & Finance Committee time to complete their work on the budget.

What's Happening in RE?

Our K-1 class is all about creating an atmosphere that is comfortable, fun, and flexible, yet predictable. Our routine begins with lighting the chalice and enthusiastically extinguishing the flame together on the count of three! We then “walk the labyrinth,” following a maze painted on a large piece of cloth that we lay on the floor. Our walks sometimes end with joys or concerns, but most often include something silly. We then take a “field trip” to the Vestry to do yoga. The students know many of our usual poses and help lead us in mimicking giraffes, trees, salamanders, and even dead bugs! On our way back to the classroom, we each grab a ukulele to show our musical sides. The point of this is not to necessarily make music; rather, it is to let each child get a feel for a musical instrument and what its possibilities might be. They get to strum, sing, and listen to others as their level of comfort allows. After music, we switch gears towards the lesson of the day. Our curriculum is called “Picture Book Unitarian Universalism” and is very well suited to this age group. Even after all the activity, the children enjoy sitting on the carpet to hear a story that relates to a UU principle and belief. Our most recent story, “Grandad’s Prayers of the Earth,” showed us that prayer can take on many forms, and that noticing and appreciating others and the world around us is a form of prayer. We often end with a craft that relates back to the story – a way for them to create something themselves that will serve as a reminder of the story and its lesson.

Social Justice Committee News

We're Working Toward Justice

Our committee is working on several fronts right now. At our last meeting on Jan 15th, there were 21 people in attendance, and our priorities ranged from protecting affordable health care to equal rights, LGBTQ issues, women's rights—including preparations for the upcoming Women's March [both in- and out-of-state initiatives, communicating, resisting, food security, taking effective, non-negative action (e.g. contacting legislators, including putting our bodies on the line at their door steps) on the things we are passionate about]. We recognize we can't do everything at once but we are striving to do what we can.

We're presenting a draft document to Council regarding how our UUSB congregation can develop consensus about ballot initiatives (e.g., referendums) and other SJ issues to officially endorse and actively support. We will suggest how the SJ committee can move forward with endorsements and coalitions and, most importantly, delineate a process for the congregation to arrive at a *resolution*, i.e., a formal expression of an opinion or an intention to take a stand on a political or social issue, as we did in actively and publicly supporting Equal Marriage Rights. We'd like to be ready for this by the Annual Meeting in May.

Here are some SJ actions/activities currently underway:

Last two sessions of our discussion group, on how we as a mostly "white" congregation can help in the *Black Lives Matter Movement*, will take place in January and February. Then we hope to share what we have learned with the congregation.

Two discussion sessions (Sun., February 12, 11:45-1:30 or Fri., February 17, 6:30-8 P.M.) on the *UUA Common Read: Third Reconstruction: How a Moral Movement is Overcoming the Politics of Division and Fear*. Info is on SJ table.

Sessions are pretty full, but there's probably a place to squeeze you in. Contact Joanie Ellis.

Four of us attended the last *MUUSAN (Maine UU Social Advocacy Network)* meeting Saturday, January 14th. The place was packed. Major emphasis was placed on ways that Progressives can work together in effective ways to resist oppressive policies and support democracy. The next meeting is Saturday, March 11, 10:00 AM to 12:00 Noon, UU Church of Augusta. All are welcome.

Stephanie Mattson, our liaison with the *Ecumenical Food Cupboard*, reported that they are in need of more volunteers. She is looking into a possible monthly 2-hour shift that a UUSB team could take on.

Maine Multicultural Center is distributing a *survey* to people moving into our community, especially from other cultures, to see what, in fact, would be helpful to them as newcomers. Hard copies are on the SJ table or access one online: <https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/DG9WRRM>. Ask someone you know "from away" to complete a survey. Check with Rev. Drew or Suzanne Kelly about how to proceed.




