DREW'S VIEWS

Four years ago, on May 1, I remember preaching my second sermon at UUSB. I will never forget that day because after the service, I was escorted downstairs to the minister's office, where I sat and waited for the congregation to hold a meeting and vote on whether to call me as your next settled minister. It was a liminal time. I waited at that threshold, about to pass through, to the very first settled ministry of my career.

That Sunday was also the Gaelic holiday of Beltane. It seemed so appropriate to me that the end of my candidating week should fall on such an auspicious day. For the ancients, Beltane was a threshold that marked the transition from winter into summer. For me, the winter symbolized the hard work of finishing seminary, my credentialing process, and saying goodbye to the congregation in Laconia, NH. For me, summer was entering into my first full time call as a settled minister.

Here we are, four years later, standing at another threshold: a new way of living, caused by the Coronavirus pandemic. This pandemic has pushed us into a new normal, full of uncertainty and isolation.The change was abrupt. Seemingly overnight, we transitioned from being together, in-person, every week to meeting online, together and apart at the same time.

It's interesting to reflect on the similarities and differences of these experiences. They feel so different, yet they are, in some ways, the same. When I accepted the call to become your settled minister, it was exciting, joyous, quick, and happy. The onslaught of the Coronavirus has been less joyful, slow, and not exactly pleasant. But, both are defined , at least in part, by uncertainty. The transition into our ministry together was easy and natural, like an uncomplicated birth. The transition into the Coronavirus world feels complicated and sticky, like a breached or extended labor, with no end in sight.

Today, we continue to find ways to connect with each other, through the practice of our faith. We've just moved online, instead of meeting in person. Still, we are present to each other in our joys and sorrows and our quest to find meaning. We continue asking questions and being on the journey together. The scenery is different, but our faith, our values, and our love of freedom, inclusion, and diversity have not waned.

Even as we feel "stuck" between the world that was and the world that now is, we are finding ways to move forward - maybe only in small steps, but they are meaningful steps. Our journey may have slowed and the path may look different, but our love and commitment to each other remains the same. As we live through this time in limbo, may we continue to focus on what we *do* have and appreciate it even more. And, may we trust in the process of the universe and the spring unfolding.

Things will change. Summer will come. A vaccine for Coronavirus will come in its own time and season. The challenge for us, as spiritual people, is to be patient, let it unfold as it will,do our best to be safe, and care for others as best we can.

In the meantime, let us enter into May with hope and gratitude. It is a busy month, with our annual meeting and the winding down of our program year. We celebrate the many people in our community who have stepped up to help lead our congregation through these unsettled times. We are all grateful and blessed to have you in our midst.

May peace, kindness, compassion, and health be with you on this journey forward together into the slow-moving unknown.

Minister's Schedule - April 2020


Rev. Drew along with other UUSB staff will be working from home, until social distancing measures are withdrawn. He will be reachable during his normal hours, either online or by phone.

April 2020. We are living in a time of history being written every day. Our friends and families will remember the pandemic of 2020 for the rest of their lives. Our children will remember going to school from home, hanging out with their family, and (probably) watching more TV/video games than their parents would ever normally allow. Please forgive the length of this update, this has been an unprecedented time for the Society and council.

How we respond to this challenging time is what will be remembered. At the UUSB council we have spent a lot of time on how we respond and how we can help lead the community through this time. We have a strong community that has had 90+ people logging into online services for the past month, committees still meeting, and a Coffee House that has people joining from all over the country. The council is honored to serve this community.

The council this month did a lot of planning for the Annual Meeting. Our bylaws, in section 6.1.A state that "The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held in May of each year at the Church, 120 Park Street, Bangor, Maine, with the time specified in the notice as directed by Council." In order to hold an annual meeting and also stay within the Stay-at-home order, this section of the bylaws needs to be amended. The Clerk and the Council, hereby announce a Special Meeting on May 17th, 2020 for the purpose of amending article 6.1.A in the bylaws.

Proposed amendment, underlined:

6.1 Meetings

A. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held in May of each year at the Church, 120 Park Street, Bangor, Maine, <u>EXCEPT WHERE required by</u>, an event or effect that cannot be reasonably anticipated or controlled (force majeure), the meetings of the society may be convened at a location other than the Church or by any other means available to secure the required quorum. Such means may include electronically convened meetings, with the time specified in the notice as directed by council.

The Special Meeting will be immediately prior to the proposed Annual Meeting, after Worship Service on **May 17th, 2020**. Details on a link and Zoom information will be sent out soon.

The council has also been working closely with the Stewardship committee for both the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 church year. In this challenging time, we need to come together as a community to continue services offered by the society. Activities that require continued financial support include, but are not limited to, the bean supper, staff payroll, utilities, and music services.

Finally, a few announcements:

- The UUSB applied for a Small Business Payroll protection loan. This loan has not yet been awarded and the fund is depleted. We do not know if we will receive this loan. Our financial position does not depend on receiving this loan.
- Council members for the 2021 year are needed. Please contact the Nominating Committee chair Glen Koehler glen.koehler@maine.edu or any member of council.
- Committee chairs, please submit annual reports to Christine Sprague, office administrator (uubangor@gmail.com) as soon as possible, if not already done

TREASURER'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF **March** written in April. March covers 75% of the year.

Income for the month of March was \$15,027. Expenses were \$17,384 leaving a balance of (\$2,357) for the month. The net income for the 9 months ending 3/31/20 is \$5,656.

Income in March, including pledges, was \$5,191. We need an average monthly pledge income of \$9,143 to stay on track. Our 9-month total to \$91,406 which is 74.5% of the budget. Pledgers are sending in checks and using the VANCO donate option on the church's website; both are great ways to make your pledge payment, while church is in Zoom mode. We had endowment income of \$7,976, which included \$5,172 from the Roberts fund which pays twice a year. The March checking account balance was \$15,162 up slightly from February's \$15,000.

Fuel expenses have been modest. Our bill for 04/15/20 was \$664.83. Last year, the amount was \$1,177.67 The total cost through 3/31/20 is \$7,501 and last year it was \$10,569 for the period. There is \$2,275 unspent.

Rental income through March is \$6,713. Two of our renters, Women with Wings and New Renaissance Singers, have decided to pay their rental fees for the rest of the year, though they are not using the space. It is super to have such generous groups.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at the Annual Meeting that takes place after the service on May 17th. Besides approving the budget for the next year which begins July 1st., we will elect new members to the church council, and the Committee on Shared Ministry among others. Volunteers are needed to get involved in these important groups that work behind the scenes to support Rev. Drew in making UUSB a vibrant positive force in the Greater Bangor community.

New Options for Membership

It had the largest attendance, with approximately 49 people participating. It raised the most money ever, coming in at \$6,710. And, it had the most people taking part in the 19 different items, with 34 separate people winning an item or a seat at a dinner. In the past, we have had roughly 34 total attendees and fewer winners.

Last Month


In April, we shared half of our undesignated donations with Faith Linking in Action. Even with all services being online, we were able to give **\$276** to FLIA!

It's official! Election Day has moved from June 9 to

July 14. Maine voters will vote to nominate party candidates for the offices of U.S. Senate, U.S. Congress, Maine State Senate, and Maine State House. You must be enrolled in a political party to vote in that party's primary election. Our job is to encourage absentee voting to keep voters low at the polls to allow for social distancing. On April 10, Governor Mills issued an executive order allowing for absentee ballot applications up to and including Election Day.
