### **DREW'S VIEWS**

Dear Ones.

The month of November begins with the remembrance of All Souls Day - a day to honor our beloved ones who have died. We remember the ways that they touched our lives and our shared collective history. It is a tender time and a sacred one.

When I was a kid, I remember learning history as being very crisp, clear, and linear. History was factual, with an emphasis on learning a specific truth associated with a particular event or events. Learning history was like learning multiplication tables - apparent, very specific, not open to much in the way of interpretation.

Even in my undergraduate studies, there was an emphasis on this learning in history. It wasn't until my first class in theological school that I learned a new way of engaging history. In my first class of my graduate program, our professor took a very different view. The class was "Contemporary Islam." I remember my classmates and me complaining to our professor that his reading list of ten books was a bit excessive. Over the semester, however, we began to understand our professor's reasoning: history involves looking not at one history (the history of the "winners"), but many histories.

During the class, we looked at historical events through many lenses to discover the complexities of many truths and realities. There was no one answer, but often the truth of a minority perspective was much more revealing about the particular event or time. Our Professor wanted us to read so much, not because he wanted to be demanding, but instead to be more thorough, complete, and wholistic. Each book we read offered a different perspective on the same events in history. There were colonial/colonizer views, colonized views, spiritual views, economic views, and political views. All are connected, but painted with very different perspectives.

A great example of this need to look deeper into

our history comes from our reexamination of the holiday called Thanksgiving, a uniquely American Harvest Celebration, based on a very limited historical truth and the wisdom of the need to be thankful. However, it has also whitewashed the struggles of indigenous peoples to maintain their own sovereignty and right to equality, as we have learned from the Wabanaki tribes and groups like Maine Wabanaki Reach. We have learned of the ways colonizers systematically stripped, stole, and tricked away the land of Maine from the care of the indigenous peoples at the same time that the colonizers unleashed the violence of genocide. Thanks to this newer approach to looking at our history, we are learning how to be more aware of history beyond the white colonial version, moving to include the histories of Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC), women, and LGBTQ2+ communities. Our history is complexed and our assumptions need to be reexamined from multiple perspectives in order to separate the truth our ancestors have taught us from what is misleading and wrong.

This is also true for understanding our family histories. People whom we have loved were complex people too. Members of our families were and are flawed, but also have redeeming qualities. Either way, their existence and their influence on who we are and how we see ourselves through the lens of history is important because part of how we see is them is how we too will be seen by our children and our children's children. It behooves us to continue to be students of history, to examine our pasts, to inform our futures, and to not be constrained by a rote interpretation that is one sided.

There is much turmoil these days between people who want history to remain static, even in the face of verifiable contradiction - the lies of stolen elections, the denial of the Holocaust, the whitewashing of slavery and colonial destruction of thriving cultures.

So, this month, as we examine our collective histories, let us be open to remembering those who informed us and have gone before. Let us view them through the many perspectives to see all their complexities and to recognize the ways they have helped us and harmed us. Let us learn from their stories and experiences to be people of spirit and faith who continue to strive to be bolder in our caring, compassion, and kindness

May we embrace all we are grateful for and use our wisdom and discernment to make the world a better and fairer place for *all* people, not just our own.

### COUNCIL CRIER

### Creation of Capital Improvement Task Force

The Council voted to develop a task force that would help move identified capital improvements forward. This group would be responsible for seeking out a new building inspection report, which was last done by Perkins Home Services in 2018. In addition, this group would also assist in obtaining quotes, making priority recommendations on necessary repairs as well as creating a proposal for Council and Trustees with short- and long-term building repairs. Task Force will include members from the Trustees, Buildings and Grounds Committee, and the Council.

### COVID-19 & In-Person Gatherings Update

While hospitalizations are down, transmission of COVID-19 still remains high in the region. We are hopeful that vaccinations for children age 5-12 will be approved by early November. In addition, boosters are now being provided for certain eligible groups. Council will look at wording in the COVID-19 policy to determine if appropriate changes can be made to allow for a gradual reopening of the building and to allow for small group meetings. We will assess the ability to begin hybrid services in December. In addition, the Council voted that if you are not able to provide proof of vaccination status, a negative COVID test 72 hours prior will be acceptable to attend in-person SEE events.

# Dare to Oream FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

We're one month into getting the raffle tickets out there and sold! But we still need your help! There is only one month left and we want to answer some of your Raffle FAQs.

**Do you have to buy tickets?** No, no one has to buy tickets. Ticket sales are entirely voluntary. But, we'd love it if you got one for yourself.

**Do you have to sell tickets?** No, no one is required to sell tickets. *But* if they aren't sold, we may be short in our annual budget for the year. Without the raffle or if we don't make enough with the raffle, we will have to raise money some other way or cut funding somewhere, such as staffing or supplies.

**Is it hard to sell tickets?** Not really. You have to keep two things in mind.

- 1. All the proceeds go to the church and the church outreach programs.
- 2. It is as much about selling the rights to dream as it is actually winning the prize. Throughout the pandemic people have constantly been dreaming about where they would go or what they would do when it's over. It's hard to go to the movies for \$20 now, so how is that any different? Except, see 1) above, all the proceeds go to the church programs. And the winner gets to go anywhere in the world and have dinner and accommodations for free!

**How do I sell the tickets?** First you get tickets, either from Christine in the office, by appointment, or from Linda Sisson at her home, also by appointment. You can also pick up tickets on November 14, from 11:30-12:30 at UUSB during the Food Collection and Open-Air Concert or at the Wreaths Sale on December 4 from 10:00-12:00 before the drawing.

You will receive one or more envelopes with a simple "how to" sheet and anywhere a booklet of ten tickets. As you sell them you record who they are sold to and put the ticket stub (with their name on it) and their cash or check into the envelope and turn it back in at church. If you don't sell all the tickets, just turn those back in too.

**How are we doing so far?** Well, we've distributed about 540 of the 1000 tickets so far and we've received back the money from about 122 sold tickets. Not bad, but we have to keep it up and try and sell ALL of the tickets.

**When is the drawing?** December 4th, 2021 will be the big raffle drawing at church after the Wreath & Swag Sale at 12:00. You do not need to be present to win.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF SEPTEMBER. This report covers 25% of the year.

Total income for the month of September was \$19,365, Expenses were \$16,614 leaving a net income of \$2751 for the month. In Sept 2020 there was a net income of (\$1,413). YTD income is \$74,99, 32.5%. of the year's budget In FY21 YTD income was \$59,830, 30% of the year's budget.


September income included pledge of \$5,272. Plate donations were \$359. Half of that amount was split between UUSB Food programs \$100 and UUA Disaster Relief \$80....Endowments were \$9,495.

VANCO: In September: 9 people used the Vanco link to make payments totaling \$636.98 gross in all categories with a net of \$618.62. Fees were \$18.36 and the offset paid was \$13.82 Additional charges invoiced were \$20.75. Donations were General Fund for \$152, pledges for \$315, Share the Plate for \$152 and Minister's Discretionary \$2.

Expenses for the month break down as Personnel \$12,426 (75% of total costs), Building \$2,091 (12%), Fair Share to the UUA \$845 (5%), Administrative \$617 (4%), and Congregational expenses for \$635 (4%). Total expenses for 3 months was 22.3% of the year's budget.

We are entering our season of major fund raisers. Raffle tickets are NOT being sold online this year, so please contact Christine in the office or Linda Sisson at home for details: to buy tickets or get tickets to sell. The raffle sales end on December 3. Success of this event is ESSENTIAL for funding salaries, building

# SHARE THE PLATE

Open Air Chimes Concert & Food Collection



On Sunday, November 14, UUSB will once again host our Second Sunday Food Drive and Open Air Concert, the church's monthly community food collection, from 12:00–12:30. There will be drop off bins on the Park Street sidewalk in front of the church for those wishing to donate.

From 12:00-12:30, there will also be a concert from the church's historic bell tower. UUSB's 10-bell, Meneely "C Chime" is one of only 6 genuine tower bell instruments in Maine and the only manually-played chime in Bangor (installed 1919).

We invite all within the Bangor community to step outside and take a listen. You are welcome to enjoy from the church lawn, surrounding areas, or your car, but please wear masks and social distance.

The food collected is given to the Ecumenical Food Pantry in Bangor. Want to help feed souls, but don't can't give food? They can also take monetary donations, which buys up to six pounds of food for every dollar given. Make checks out to Bangor Ecumenical Food Cupboard (Bangor EFC), and we'll keep feeding souls.

In 2020, you gave 2,833.5 pounds of food, more than one and one quarter metric tons. In 2021, to date, you have contributed 2,279.5 pounds. You are making a difference.

### What Are Grocery Cards? And, Why Buy Them?



So, you want to know, "What are grocery cards?" Good question!

Grocery cards are Hannaford gift cards that UUSB sells as a type of fundraiser. We purchase the gift cards in bulk directly from Hannaford with a 5% discount. This means that, by purchasing grocery cards from UUSB, you are able to donate 5% of your grocery bill to UUSB without increasing your grocery bill!

The Hannaford gift cards, aka grocery cards, can be used for almost all purchases at Hannaford. The very limited exceptions being money orders, money transfer services, utility bills, and returned check fees. Most grocery cards purchased through UUSB also can not be used for tobacco or alcohol.

Now that you know what they are and how easy it is to give a few extra dollars to UUSB without any extra spending, I bet you want to know how you get your grocery cards. No need to worry because it is easy to start getting your cards at any time, using the following info.
