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DREW'S VIEWS

The New Year's beginning brings a sense of excitement and hopefulness.

It's an opportunity to leave the last year's difficulties behind and start with a clean slate of infinite possibilities.

People practice many popular rituals this time of year; popular among them are making wishes for the year to come, setting goals, or making New Year's resolutions.

Interestingly, these two common traditions focus either on the following:

The past - leaving the negative of the old year behind,

The future - the excitement (or dread) of what may come.

While intentionally leaving the not-so-useful experiences behind is helpful, setting resolutions is more problematic. Research has shown that most New Year's resolutions rarely come to fruition. The result tends to be, at best, disappointment and, at worst, a sense of blame, shame, and defensiveness or self-loathing because we could not live up to our expectations.

In the middle of these paradigms, I find solace in the wisdom from Buddhist psychology and meditation practice that teaches us to be present and find our center in the here and now. Not in the past or future.

Using this approach changes the dynamic. For the past, I say, "What wisdom, joy, or hurt am I carrying with me now, at this moment?" Looking to the future, I say, "What intention, direction, or focus do I want to hold in my awareness as I move into the moment or year ahead?"

These two approaches ground us in the here and now. They help us separate our assumptions from the past, while connecting us with our inner wisdom in the now. These approaches free us from the burdens of creating unrealistic goals or expectations that lead to judgment in the future. Utilizing this awareness helps us find our center any time of the year, regardless of the season for our state of being.

As I write this, I am aware of several dynamics that are very much alive in my soul. There is some excitement about going on a sabbatical at the end of January for six months. There is also a feeling of sadness connected to the awareness that I will miss you. I know that the congregation will function without me, and I like being actively engaged in the day-to-day parts of this community. I feel more relaxed knowing that by the time you read this article, we expect that council will have hired a sabbatical minister (who will be a good fit and excellent support to our congregation while I am gone).

During my sabbatical I will not be reachable. My intention is to send a brief update each month as to where I am, what I am doing, and some of the spiritual aspects of my journey. I will simply be posting – not responding or dialoging. I know that I will think about you often.

My hope is that while we have some time apart we'll all have the opportunity to be present to what is alive within our spirits. Hopefully in those moments of missing each other, we'll also find space to connect with our respective centers and then share our journey and wisdom with each other when I return.



Budget for FY24

Rosemary Parsons, as treasurer, provided a report on the draft FY24 budget. We are expecting a drop in external funds. In regards to restricted funds, we are also expecting smaller balances due to the costs associated with larger projects from this past year. Additionally, building rental income has also been down. However, these

financial challenges are not unique to UUSB as churches across the nation have been met with similar issues, especially during the pandemic years. With respect to UU values, the Council is recommending salary increases for the coming fiscal year. Finally, a

fundraising raffle is planned for the spring to help cover future costs. More will be shared in the months ahead.

Welcome Rev. Rebecca Liberty, our new Sabbatical Minister!


The UUSB Council, based on the recommendation of the Sabbatical Minister Search Team, unanimously voted to offer the position of sabbatical minister to Reverend Rebecca Liberty. Rebecca is an ordained Lutheran minister living in Bangor with her family. She has served as an interim minister to several other congregations in the Bangor area, including Redeemer Lutheran and, most recently, St. John's Episcopal.

In 2016 and 2017, Rev. Liberty facilitated and co-led our UUSB Council Retreats, where her gifts as a listener and spiritual leader helped settle Rev. Drew into his ministry at UUSB. She has also

served as Executive Director of the Wilson Center in Orono and taught a comparative religions course at the University of Maine's Honor's College.

On January 22, Rev. Liberty will be officially introduced to the congregation as we bid Rev. Drew bon voyage on his last Sunday in the pulpit before he leaves on sabbatical.

We are excited to have Rev. Liberty join us and provide quarter-time coverage while Rev. Drew is away. Welcome, Rev. Liberty!

TREASURER'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF NOVEMBER 2022. This report covers 42% of the year.

Total income for the month of November is \$18,744. YTD income is \$93,603, 38% of the budget. Income in November 2021 was \$17,096 and YTD 2021 income was \$104,575, 45% of the year's budget.

Expenses were \$20,502, leaving a loss of \$1,758 for the month. YTD expenses are \$93,250, 38% of the budget. In November 2021, expenses were \$18,163 and last year's YTD expenses were \$87,824, 37% of the budget.

November income included pledge of \$11,866. Plate donations were \$766. Half of that amount goes to the Bangor Area Homeless Shelter. Endowments were \$3,931, Rental income was \$310. General Fund was \$629.


VANCO: In November, 14 people used the Vanco link to make payments totaling \$1,414 gross in all categories with a net of \$1,395.32 Fees were \$14.89 and the offset paid was \$24.98. Additional charges invoiced were \$28.77. Donations were: General Fund for \$129, pledges for \$1,051, and Share the Plate for \$234,

Expenses for the month break down as Personnel \$13,260 (65% of total costs), Building \$3,633 (18%), Fair Share to the UUA \$845 (4%), Administrative \$920 (4%), and Congregational expenses for \$1,832 (9%). Total expenses for 5 months was 37% of the year's budget.

Notes: I will be monitoring heating costs and comparing them to last year. As of Nov 2021, we had spent \$61, less than 1% of the budget which was \$9,276. As of Nov 2022 we have spent \$474, which is 4% of the budget of \$12,000.

Building Expenses are up this month because of repairs to the furnace. Due to administrative confusion with the state office of Gaming, the Raffle has been postponed until Spring. It is still very necessary for meeting our expenses since it raises \$10,000 and I hope that all will participate when we start up again. Council and B&F are already working on next year's budget, with plans to increase the salaries of our wonderful staff. Stay tuned.





In 2022, we have collected 2,067.5 pounds so far! You are making a difference!

COMMUNITY BEAN SUPPER

UUSB AT 4:00 PM

Throughout the pandemic, our volunteers have continued to put on the monthly community bean suppers as to-go meals. This has made it possible for at-risk volunteers and community members to pick up their food and avoid as much potential exposure as possible. We are thankful to all the amazing volunteers who have done all this work, despite the stress and changes over the last two years!

As guidelines and risks have changed, the Community Bean Supper has also made adjustments. With our recent changes, meals may be eaten at UUSB in the Dorothy Memorial Hall or taken home in to-go containers. This allows us to bring back the community and social aspects of this monthly event, while still accommodating those who may be at higher risk or unable to attend in person.

If you have any large paper grocery bags, like from Hannaford2Go, the Bean Supper crew are looking for additional bags to use to send meals home with those who attend each month.

SHARE THE PLATE



In January, half of the undesignated funds in the plate will go to the UUSB Food Security Programs. This includes the Bean Suppers that we host on the fourth, and fifth, Saturdays each month; our donation to the Soup Kitchen at the Salvation Army, in lieu of making lunches during the pandemic; and our Bag Lunch program, to give lunches for those attending our Bean Suppers.





In November, we gave \$383 to the Penquis Fuel Assistance Program. Fuel Assistance (Home Energy Assistance Program, HEAP) assists income-eligible households in Penobscot, Piscataquis, and Knox counties with high winter heating costs. Homes may be heated with oil, kerosene, coal, pellets, wood, LP gas, or electricity.
