#### HIGHLIGHTS:

- 2 FROM REV. REBECCA
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As the earth thaws out from winter, it brings to mind another kind of "unfreezing"—the kind that social psychologist Kurt Lewin named in the 1940s as part of the change process in organizations. Using an ice block as a metaphor, "unfreezing" refers to the first stage of change, which has to happen before it can take on a different shape.

In previous ministries, I have been privileged to accompany several congregations through times of change. I've found that "unfreezing" is a simple idea, but it's not easy. I think of it as wondering together, repeatedly, whether the way things are, is the way they MUST be. Not always, but usually, the answer is no: Things could be different and still reflect the community's values. But change requires us to resist our very human tendency to remain "frozen" in particular habits and structures.

To be clear, habit and structure are good things. We depend on them in community, both for comfort and for the smooth functioning of community life. But if we hold onto them past the point of usefulness—when it becomes clear, for example, that they are not as welcoming to people of different ages or backgrounds—they become obstacles. That's when we are due for some "unfreezing."

Here's one recent example from the "community" of my own family. As my kids grow, they take on more tasks around the house, such as cleaning chores and care for our cats. Intellectually, I know that one of the best ways to turn kids off from helping, is to tell them they're doing it wrong. But it's so hard not to correct them, or worse, to take over! There's a fine line between teaching them to do something properly, and communicating that they are not good enough. So before offering a correction, I try to stop and ask myself, "MUST it be this way?" Not always, but usually, the answer is no: They could do it a different way, their way rather than mine, and still get the job done.

Since my kids are still growing, my husband and I are repeatedly "unfreezing." It is hard work to resist enforcing our own habits and structures. It looks a lot like congregations I've known, where unfreezing is not a one-time thing, a single identifiable stage in community life. Instead, it's an ongoing process essential, among other things, for integrating new people—such as younger generations, people new to the tradition, or people from different backgrounds—all of whom may have different ways of doing things than the habits and structures we know best.

I had a professor in seminary who advised ministers to change things regularly, so that the congregation would stay practiced at adapting to change. That way, the challenges involved in change would become normalized, rather than an exception. People would go through "unfreezing" on a regular basis, and keep their habits and structures in perspective. This came to mind during the pandemic, when virtually every congregation, including this one, has adapted to many changes. Over several years, there has been not been much opportunity for "refreezing"!

I want to honor your hard work, especially as you are continuing it now during this time of Rev. Drew's sabbatical. Many habits and structures are different without his presence and leadership. Some anxiety and discomfort are natural, as in all "unfreezing." But the skills a community practices together during such a time—even a temporary one like a sabbatical—are invaluable for adapting to whatever the future brings. It is such a privilege to witness those skills and accompany you during this time!

#### Report from the Special Congregational Meeting March 19, 2023

The Congregation met following a sermon by Rev Sara Hayman of the Ellsworth UU Church.

The recommended UUSB bylaws clarifications were approved in total.

Rev Sara spoke on the UUA's proposed 8th Principle: **"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian** Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

There was much discussion with the most centered around people not feeling informed enough to make a decision though 6 members wanted to vote in favor of accepting this Principle and the majority voting to postpone a decision until our Annual Meeting on May 21. This will allow time to gain a greater understanding of the proposal.


Adding to the discussion was another change that will be addressed at the UUA General Assembly, a revision of the UUA's Bylaws Article II. This Article's recommended updated version would take the Principles we know and love, and put their spirit in a graphic similar to a flower with" Love" at the center and petals each holding a single word: Interdependence, Pluralism, Justice, Transformation, Equity, and Generosity. Here is the proposed language:

#### Section C-2.2. Values and Covenant.

As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant, congregation-to-congregation and through our association, to support and assist one another in our ministries. We draw from our heritages of freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building on the foundation of love.

Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love.

Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:



word love over the flame, with six outstretched arms that create a circle around each of the core values and form a six petal flower shape. Each arm is a different color and clockwise they are: Interdependence (Orange), Equity (Red), Transformation (Purple), Pluralism (Dark Blue), Generosity (Teal), and Justice (Yellow).

#### Interdependence

We honor the interdependent web of all existence.

We covenant to cherish Earth and all beings by creating and nurturing relationships of care and respect. With humility and reverence, we acknowledge our place in the great web of life, and we work to repair harm and damaged relationships.

#### Pluralism

We celebrate that we are all sacred beings diverse in culture, experience, and theology.

We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.

#### Justice

We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive.

We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression. We support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions.

#### Transformation.

We adapt to the changing world.

We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change is fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.

#### Generosity

We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.

We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.

#### Equity

We declare that every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and worthiness.

We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities.

Your Council invites members and friends to learn more about these proposals. At least one discussion meeting will be held in April and links will be resent for independent study.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF FEBRUARY 2023. This report covers 58% of the year.

Total income for the month of February 2023 was \$18,369 and YTD income was \$156,798, 63.9% of the budget. In February 2022 income was \$18,205. YTD income in 2022 was \$176,195, 76.5% of the year's budget. The drop in YTD income of \$19,397 is mainly because we have not had the Raffle, which brought in \$16,040 last year

Expenses were \$22,908, creating a loss of (\$4,539) for the month. YTD expenses are \$164,615, 67% of the budget. In February 2022 expenses were \$21,809 and that year's YTD expenses were \$159,194, 66.7% of the budget

Income included pledge of \$10,441. Plate donations were \$781. Half of that amount goes to the UUSB Food Programs. Endowments were \$4,390, Fundraising was \$845. Other income was \$1,912.

VANCO: In February: 13 people used the Vanco link to make payments totaling \$1,336.60 gross in all categories with a net of \$1,286.49. Fees were \$10.24 and the offset paid was \$18.10. Additional charges invoiced were \$39.87, which includes the monthly fee of \$10 for the site. Donations were: General Fund for \$49, Pledges for \$1,155.50, Share the Plate for \$114., and


Expenses for the month break down as Personnel \$15,651 (66% of total costs), Building \$4,069 (18%), Fair Share to the UUA \$845 (4%), Administrative \$ 573 (2%), and Congregational expenses for \$1,758 (8%) Total expenses for 9 months was 67% of the year's budget.

In summary, we have received 64% of our budgeted income, and spent 67%. That 3% difference is \$7,817. It is imperative that we have a successful Raffle selling all 1,000 tickets - Raffle begins on April 2nd and ends on May 21st.





Since 2020, when we began our open-air chimes concert and food collection, we have collected over 8,000 pounds of feed! You are making a difference!

## SHARE THE PLATE





Every Sunday, we share half of our undesignated plate offerings with an organization that works toward our UU values. In April, half of the undesignated funds in the plate will go to Faith Linking in Action. FLIA, is a group of Bangor-area congregations working together to "go upstream" to address the reasons people are falling into and getting stuck in poverty. Participants include most major faith traditions in our region.

FLIA is actively involved with multiple local organizations, including the Greater Bangor Area Housing Coalition, Dignity First, Food AND Medicine, Right from the Start, and the Maine Association for the Education of Young Children. They also help organize the annual Interfaith Martin Luther King Service.

Faith Linking in Action maintains calendars to share all the local free community meals, food pantries, and other services with regular updates, so all people can access the help they need.

In February, we shared out plate with our own UUSB Food Programs. Outreach efforts, like the bean suppers and bag lunches will receive \$390 from February.
