Creative Process in Community FROM REV. REBECCA LIBERTY

The worship theme for May, Creativity, is often associated with originality and inventiveness, especially in the arts. Those are indeed wonderful ways to explore and practice creativity, but creativity is also much more than that. The ways we live each day—from work and service to caregiving and household tasks—are all opportunities for us to find our own authentic approach and unique perspective on daily life. Each time we bring our authentic and unique selves to something we do, we are "being creative."

While we sometimes think of creativity as a solo pursuit, it happens in community as well. In fact, community itself is something we create together out of our own authentic approaches and unique perspectives. It wouldn't be the same if any one of our contributions were missing.

I learned this from a year living in intentional community after college. As members of the Lutheran Volunteer Corps, six other young adults and I shared a commitment to service and simplicity, an eagerness to explore communal living, and a house in Washington, D.C. While we worked full-time in different service organizations, at home together we talked a lot about what, exactly, we were supposed to be intentionally "creating."

What we came to understand together was that community was not some "product" we were making that would one day be completed. Instead, community was made in the process itself—the daily living of compromise, shared space and time, empathy, and cooperation (whose turn was it to take out the compost, anyway?!). It was created over time in the ongoing and practical commitment to one another.

What I have come to understand more recently was that the community was creating each of us at the same time. According to Matthew Fox, this may be true of anything we create—that some of the most significant formation happening during the creative process, is our own. He wrote, "Art as meditation reminds people—so that they will never forget—that the most beautiful thing a potter produces is… the potter."

In any community to which we contribute our authentic and unique selves, over time we are creating the people we want to be, along with the community we want to belong to. Neither we ourselves nor the community is ever "finished," but it is a tremendous gift to witness and participate in the creative process with others.

TREASURER'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF MARCH 2023. This report covers 75% of the year.

Total income for the month of March was \$18,954. YTD income is \$175,752, 72% of the year's budget. In March 2022, income was \$18,500. Last year's YTD income was \$194,694, 84.5% of the year's budget.

Expenses were \$22,912. creating a loss of (\$3,960) for the month. YTD expenses are \$187,531, 76% of the budget. YTD deficit is (\$11,779). In March 2022, expenses were \$21,225 and that year's YTD expenses were \$180,419, 75.7% of the budget. At the end of March 2022, we had a credit balance of \$14,275. As stated last month, the Raffle income had already been received in 2022.

March 2023 income included pledge of \$7,122 Plate donations were \$717. Half the plate was sent to MUUSAN, the Maine UU State Advocacy Network. Endowments were \$8,255, Rental income was \$240. General Fund was \$486. Fundraising was \$358. During the Sabbatical, we are using savings we accrued for this event, and transferred \$1,769 from that account which is counted as income.

VANCO: In March, 15 people used the Vanco link to make payments totaling \$4,823.48 gross in all categories with a net of \$4,682.51. Fees were \$112.76 and the offset paid was \$104.48. Additional charges invoiced were \$28.21, which includes the monthly fee of \$10 for the site. Donations were: General Fund for \$301, Pledges for \$4,232, Share the Plate for \$136, and Minister's Discretionary \$50.

Expenses for the month break down as Personnel \$15,651 (66% of total costs), Building \$4,069 (18%), Fair Share to the UUA \$845 (4%), Administrative \$ 573 (2%), and Congregational expenses for \$1,758 (8%) Total expenses for 9 months was 67% of the year's budget.

In summary, we have received 64% of our budgeted income, and spent 67%. That 3% difference is \$7,817. It is imperative that we have a successful Raffle selling all 1,000 tickets - Raffle begins on April 2nd and ends on May 21st.

(An excerpt from April's Soul Matters Small Groups Packet...)

One of the best ways to explore our monthly themes is to bring them into the conversations you have with those

closest to you. It's a powerful way to deepen our conversations, and our relationships. Below is a list of "creativity questions" to help you on your way. As always, keep a lookout for how your inner voice is trying to send you a word of comfort or challenge through these conversions with others.

Creativity Questions

- What is something creative you did when you were younger that you no longer do? Why don't you still do it? Would you want to do it?
- Were you a child that colored in the lines or outside of them? Does that childhood self still have a leading role in your life?
- Has creativity ever gotten you in trouble?
- Are you as "creatively maladjusted" as you imagined you would be?
- If your life was a song or movie, which song or movie would you be?
- Which artistic metaphor best describes what life feels like to you right now? a blank canvas? a 1000-piece puzzle? a detective novel? a garden? a writer's block? a work in progress? Something else?
- Has creativity ever healed or saved you?

SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

Some Changes

Suzanne Kelly and Valerie Carter have decided to offer the reins of leadership of the Social Justice Committee to some new blood. Both of us are passionate about the work that has been done and can continue to be done. We welcome being participants but we are stepping down from leadership positions. It may be that there will be "decentralized" Social Justice issue groups somewhat like the framework for Maine Unitarian-Universalist State Advocacy Network (MUUSAN). MUUSAN has four issue groups: Racial, Native and Immigrant Justice; Healthcare; Climate Change; and Democracy in Action. Faith Linking in Action is comprised of four issue groups that take on local issues that hold people back: Food Insecurity; Housing (lack of affordable housing); Public Transportation; and Childcare (lack of affordable, adequate care). Or there may be sudden, compelling issues that people want to address.

We plan on having a meeting (zoom, in person or hybrid) sometime in May or June that's open to the Social Justice Committee and other members of the congregation to find out what priorities there are AND, MOST IMPORTANTLY: WHAT YOU ARE INTERESTED IN WORKING ON OR HEADING UP.

Our Power Referendum Presentation

Jill Linzee, Chair of the MUUSAN Climate Change issue group, provided an excellent overview of the referendum that Mainers will get to vote for on Election Day, November 6 th . If it passes it would mean shifting distribution of electric power by CMP and Versant to distribution by Pine Tree Power, a non-profit entity. We had 25+ attending the presentation in person and via Zoom. For those of you who missed the presentation, there are materials on the Social Justice table about the referendum and how you can help.

Things are heating up as the 131 Legislative Session and its proposed bills take shape. On Sunday, May 14, UUSB will, hopefully, once again host our Second Sunday Food Drive & Open Air Concert, the church's monthly community food collection, from 11:30–12:00.

There will be drop off bins on the Park Street sidewalk in front of the church for those wishing to donate. There is also a new option to donate inside, before or after the service. The bins will be placed in the Dorothy for your items, before moving outside for the drive-thru and curbside donations.

We invite everyone to step outside and take a listen. You are welcome to enjoy from the church lawn, surrounding areas, or your car.

The food collected is given to the Ecumenical Food Pantry in Bangor. They can also take monetary donations, which buys up to six pounds of food for every dollar given. Make checks out to Bangor Ecumenical Food Cupboard (Bangor EFC), and we'll keep feeding souls.

Since 2020, when we began our open-air chimes concert and food collection, we have collected over 8,000 pounds of feed! You are making a difference!

There is a sign-up sheet for volunteers to continue this important event. You can sign up in the Dorothy to help collect food on Sundays or to deliver food to the Ecumenical Food Cupboard during the week. Without volunteers, this outreach opportunity will, unfortunately, have to come to an end. With one week each, we could cover the volunteers for the next year and then some!

With our recent changes, meals may be eaten at UUSB in the Dorothy Memorial Hall or taken home in to-go containers. This allows us to bring back the community and social aspects of this monthly event, while still accommodating those who may be at higher risk or unable to attend in person.
