DREW'S VIEWS

Dear Ones,

Welcome to 2024 which promises to be a big one for our Unitarian Universalist faith and our own beloved community.

This month we will be exploring the spiritual theme of Liberating Love, which is the center of our newly proposed UUA Article II Bylaws. Our current Article II of the UUA Bylaws are fondly referred to as our Seven UU Principles & Purposes, and Sources. They are the an articulation of what our faith stands for, and what we consider to be our highest aspirations and values as people of faith. At the center is surrounded bv Love Interdependence, Equality, Transformation, Pluralism, Generosity and Justice (see image on page 4). That that the newly proposed articulation of our UU values - while taking on a different form, recognizes that all we do, everything we aspire to creating, is fueled by the power of love. But what does that mean? Especially in our world today that is filled with hate, and disruption, disharmony, and disease?

Putting Love at the center requires us to accept people where they are - to listen, to let go of judgement and allow others have their of to own process transformation. One of the most influential books I read in high school was the biography of Mahatma Gandhi. I remember how he spoke his truth to

the British Colonial powers and was rebuffed time and time again. Like a more modern day Moses speaking to Pharaoh saying, "let my people go." Gandhi didn't bring plagues - instead he organized non-violent protest. He so endured hardship and sometimes deep physical and spiritual anguish as he witnessed the oppression of his fellow country people and suffering created by the caste system. Still he worked developing towards liberation bv relationship and sitting with people in their pain and imperfection. Liberation took time. It took patience, it took spiritual strength and practice.

By living into his theology of satyagraha (truth force), and bringing others with him they were able to bring an end to British Colonial rule. This work of liberation was remains one of the greatest feats of non-violent action in history. It took almost three decades to accomplish this task but love of the other (the British) remained at the core of his practice.

While I confess that I have a bit of an

attachment and fondness for our current UU Principles and Purposes I have to say that I like the notion of putting Liberating Love at the center of our values as UU's.

In our current UU Principles the only reference to the power of love is in our sources after we talk about words and deeds of prophetic, women and men, that challenges to confront powers of structures of evil, with justice compassion, and the transforming power of love." Putting love at the center, reminds us that true love is Divine. Love, transcends, power, privilege, discrimination, be it from God, or from our fellow human beings really is the only power that will heal a broken world out of balance with itself.

There are only five pages. Copies have been attached to the back of this issue of the *Chalice & Chimes*.

Another way that we can show our Liberating Love is to listen. It is in that spirit that our we have created a UUSB survey team that is working on creating comprehensive congregation-wide survey that we will be sending out in March to ask for feedback from UUSB members, friends and guests on different aspects of congregational life. Our timeline for this survey is as follows:

- January Our Survey Team is asking UUSB Committees to submit one or two specific "big picture questions" related to each committees work in the congregation and then several follow up questions to help access the answer to the primary question.
- February Our Survey Team will gather questions and take some time to compile the survey questions and possibly adjust questions to make them as effective as possible.
- March The survey will be shared with the congregation. We ask that everyone (members, friends, guest and visitors) fill out the survey and return it by the end of March. The survey teams is also working on creating focus groups for your younger SEE youth so we can hear from our young people too.
- April We will gather the data from the survey responses, and analyze the data and create a survey report.
- May The final survey report will be shared with the congregation at the annual meeting.
- Fall '24 We will use the findings of the survey to have a couple of congregational conversations around creating a new UUSB vision for the future of UUSB!

In this way we will be able to listen and take the temperature of our congregations vision for the future and move together to living into that vision a thoughtful and aspirational way.

2024 promises to be an exciting year for UU ism and UUSB. I look forward to our continued journeying together and excited to see where all these efforts lead us in the coming year and beyond.

Just as I settled into 2023, a new year started, it often seems that is the way of things. January and the start of a new year brings a sense of beginnings, of fresh starts and of recommitting. The news from your UUSB Council this month seems to touch upon each of these themes.

The Dorothy is on track for a new beginning with a much needed accessible door. We had hoped it would be installed by the Christmas holiday, but alas, new beginnings sometimes take a bit longer than we expected. 2024 shall be the year we cross a new threshold into the Dorothy.

Council, the Buildings Grounds Committee, Karen Childs and Christine Sprague continue to brainstorm how we might accommodate the Needle Point Sanctuary's (NPS) need for administrative office space. Karen suggested a couple of creative solutions and Council agreed to further explore creating space in the SEE area of the building. Rest assured this space would be used for administrative purposes only.

Rev. Drew, Cathy Elliot, Patti Woolley and Evan Richert continue to nurture the seeds for a fresh start on our congregational visioning process. The committee plans to begin this process with a congregational survey- participation from our entire UUSB community is welcomed and desired. Council approved the committee's request to work with Molly Shea, a grad student, to develop and implement the survey.

Council approved Tim Martin's editing suggestions of the UUSB Board Book. These included removing the old, unused Email Policy as it is now incorporated into our newly adopted Social Media Covenant. Council also approved the removal of a duplicate listing of the UUSB Endowments as they are included in the UUSB Annual Report. Tracy has agreed to draft a section regarding UUSB's adoption of the Eighth Principle to be added to our UUSB History document for Council to review at our next meeting.

Speaking of our newly adopted Social Media Covenant, huge thanks to Zach Falcon and the Communications Committee for their excellent work. And.... Here it is!

On **Sunday, January 14**, UUSB will once again host our Second Sunday Food Drive & Open Air Concert, the church's monthly community food collection, from 11:30–12:00.

In 2023, we donated 1,847 pounds of food!

There will be drop off bins on the Park Street sidewalk in front of the church for those wishing to donate. You can also drop items off inside, before or after the service. The bins will be in the Dorothy, before moving outside for the drive-thru and curbside donations.

We invite everyone to step outside and take a listen to our historic chimes.

The food collected is given to the Ecumenical Food Pantry in Bangor. They can also take monetary donations, which buys up to six pounds of food for every dollar given. Make checks out to Bangor Ecumenical Food Cupboard (Bangor EFC), and we'll keep feeding souls.

If you aren't sure what to give, they are always looking for cereal, canned fruit, canned baked beans, pasta, and sauce!

Keep an eye out for potential updates and changes to the food collection and donation process, as we move into another year and have to find volunteers to make sure we can continue this important outreach.
