# DREW'S VIEWS

Dear Ones,

May is a month of transition that leads to growth. Just as the climate warms and the ground softens, it's time to prepare our garden beds and begin planting seeds with the hope and faith that those seeds will lead to growth in the future. Something in the air of Spring reminds us of these opportunities and promises—like the warm earth that cradles the seed like a swaddled baby in a warm blanket.

This year, May is especially active in the life of our congregation for two reasons:

First, at our annual meeting, we will be voting on whether our congregation wants to support the newly proposed UUA Article II changes to UUA bylaws. This section of our UUA bylaws is the source of our "Principles & Purposes." It is the part of the UUA bylaws that many of us can quote by heart from "The inherent worth and dignity of every person" (our 1st Principle) to the "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are apart" (our 7th Principle).

UUSB voting to support or not support these changes is only a first step. The next step is the vote at the UUA General Assembly in June where UUSB and all our sibling congregations will vote on whether or not the UUA will adopt the Article II Bylaw changes. If the bylaw change happens, it will become part of the UUA bylaws. The final step will be at UUSB's next annual meeting, where we will vote to affirm these finalized changes.

In some ways, this process may not feel as spiritual as the unfolding of Spring, yet it is a testament to our creed-less faith, our deeply held UU value of democratic process, and our ability to grow and change. It is empowering to know that we are part of a faith that does not seal truth into a dogmatic scripture that cannot change ever. And it also brings a bit of awkwardness as we consider letting go of a specific wording and expression of our faith that we have become familiar with. The beauty of this process is that no matter what is decided, it will be a win either way keeping the old or embracing the new, we are all part of this collective decision-making process.

The other exciting thing that will happen at our annual meeting is that the initial report on our congregational survey will be presented. These survey results are the first step in UUSB's visioning process that will continue this fall. I want to

extend a heartful thank-you to our survey team - Cathy Elliot, Evan Richert and Valerie Carter. I also want to express my appreciation to all our UUSB deep committees who helped develop thoughtful questions used in our survey. And most importantly, I want to thank each and every one of you who took the time to complete the survey. Your thoughtful responses have provided invaluable data that will guide our visioning process for years to come. THANK YOU!

This month, our theme is "The Gift of Pluralism" which is a complex term not often associated with religion. Instead, it is frequently seen as a source of rigidity. Pluralism is "a state of society in which members of diverse ethnic, racial, religious, or social groups maintain and develop their traditional culture or special interest within the confines of a common civilization." Pluralism freedom, implies diversity, equanimity, and inclusion - all qualities I associate with spirituality and Unitarian Universalism.

In many ways, pluralism is perhaps one of the more complex principles to 'live into' and practice in a polarized world, yet I believe it is one of the keys to unlocking the potential of a beloved community. How do we live together with people we disagree with? How do we live in peace with others we disagree with who are trying to convert or pressure us into thinking in ways that are limiting, blaming, shaming, and found to be harmful to the environment, Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC)? To me, it's a very delicate balance - leaving space for diversity while at the same time intolerant of abuse and harm.

In our proposed UUA Bylaw changes, the value of pluralism reads thus:

"We celebrate that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology."

It goes on to say, "We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect."

In short, accepting all beings and diversity is good, and it needs the support of freedom and responsibility to discern the culture and theology causing destruction and harm in question. There are many ways to engage in this discernment. Allowing love, curiosity, and respect to guide us makes a huge difference.

Let us continue to cultivate the seeds of love, curiosity, and respect in our hearts and actions so that we can be part of growing beloved community within our community and beyond. Blessed be!

# **COUNCIL CRIER**


Dear UUSB Community,

Spring is fast upon us. Local indicators that winter has passed include the annual Kenduskeag Stream Race, sightings of early schools of migrating Alewives, and the upcoming sowing of seeds into the earth at UUSB.

Speaking of sowing seeds... Council affirmed that volunteers are still needed for the collective food

garden program at UUSB. Planting is scheduled for April 28 following our service.

A meeting to discuss the proposed FY2025 Budget will be held following our service on April 21. Following that discussion will be a brief presentation and non-binding vote about the proposed Article II changes. We anticipate further discussions around Article II prior to our Annual Meeting vote. The UUA has a number of resources to foster understanding of these proposed changes on their website. Additionally, I found UU Wellspring's Proposed Article II Journal (see photo) to be a helpful resource.



Just as Bob Kelly predicted, unpredicted expenses have cropped up for our Buildings and Grounds. The roof in the Bell Tower has a leak and the area must be repaired to prevent further damages. Council

approved the funds for these repairs. Rissa will be meeting with the insurance adjuster later this month and, hopefully, these repairs will be covered.

Tracy presented a draft of our adoption last year of the 8th Principle. This will be added in our shared history, a document that is included in UUSB Board book. She will clarify the votes reported in the 2023 Annual Meeting minutes and provide a second draftto Council in May.

Zach Falcon provided Council with an update on the Security and Safety Protocols Committee. He and Tim have agreed to serve on the committee and are seeking others interested to join them, representatives from SEAL and Buildings and Grounds are especially encouraged to participate. Zach also reported that other local houses of worship are starting to address these issues as well. Council welcomed these collaborative efforts. Council urged scheduling of a fire drill soon as it has been some time since the last one.

UUSB still needs people to serve as delegates to UUA General Assembly. General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists where we conduct the business of the association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith and lean

fully into our mission and covenant. Serving as a delegate is a meaningful way to represent our congregation in doing the business of the UUA. Delegates must inform themselves on issues to be considered and attend business meetings where agenda items, such as the proposed changes to Article II, are discussed and voted on. Servings as a delegate is an incredible educational and spiritually nourishing experience. Any UUSB member who is interested please contact Rev. Drew, Sue McKay or Tracy Haskell.

Lastly, once again, a message of gratitude and thanks for our Beloved UUSB Community. Council is grateful for everyone for pitching in, in whatever way you have done; from participating in Fellowship Hour, helping with a clean up day, working on a fundraiser, participating in a committee, greeting a visitor, smiling as you pass in the hallway, or for simply showing up and being with us. If you want to help, but don't know how to digitize and organize files, Ben has offered to come in and help get people started with the new computer. We are just happy to get more people involved with maintaining our congregation's heritage.

# TREASURER'S REPORT MAR. 2024

This report covers 75% of the year.

Total income for the month of March was \$17,480. YTD income is \$199,633, 77% of the year's budget. In March 2023, income was \$18,954. Last year's YTD income was \$175,752, 72% of the year's budget.


Expenses were \$23,161, creating a loss of (\$5,681) for the month. YTD expenses are \$196,230, 65% of the budget. YTD net income is \$3,403. In March 2023, expenses were \$22,912 and that year's YTD expenses were \$187,531, 76% of the budget. At the end of March 2023, we had a net loss of (11,779). Because we held the Raffle in the Fall, we do not have the large YTD deficit that we had in 2023. However, since the Raffle fell over \$4,000 short of the goal, we are not repeating it in 2024. It is a lot of work for the committee, and members have expressed a dislike for doing it. Therefore, we must rely on other means for bringing in the money, such as increased Hannaford Grocery Card sales.

March 2024 income included pledge of \$8,301. Plate donations were \$739. Half the plate was sent to MUUSAN, the Maine UU State Advocacy Network. Endowments were \$7,509. Rental income was \$170. General Fund was \$55. Fundraising was \$384.

VANCO: In March, 13 people used the Vanco link to make payments totaling \$1,697.48 gross in all categories with a net of \$1,648.23. Fees were \$27.94 and the offset paid was \$26.48. Additional charges invoiced were \$27.94, which includes the monthly fee of \$10 for the site. Donations were: General Fund for \$45, Pledges for \$1,506, Share the Plate for \$120.

Expenses for the month break down as Personnel \$16,021 (69% of total expenses), Building \$5,005 (22%), Fair Share to the UUA \$869 (4%), Administrative \$993 (4%), and Congregational expenses for \$273 (1%). Total expenses for 9 months was 75.4% of the year's budget.

As you probably know, the Spring Auction was a tremendous success, bringing in \$10,000 when it was budgeted for \$7,000 (thank you everyone). Building expenses will ease off as the heating season comes to a close.
