DREW'S VIEWS

Greetings Dear Ones,

Happy September, and welcome back! I hope you have had a good summer.

Something exciting about returning at the beginning of our program year is the promise of a year ready to unfold, full of potential and opportunity – yet impossible to fully define.

There is the excitement of people returning from their summer routines and our kids and families returning to our Sunday morning programs. There is a feeling of hope that in the current political cycle, some of our dearest UU values are becoming part of our political discussions leading up to the November elections. Then there is the intense beauty this time offers - the beginning of the harvest season full of beautiful smells, sounds, sights, and tastes - making this time of year so unique.

September and fall are times of transition and change. It has the potential to help us wisely select and choose the invitations that lead us toward growth, freedom, and perhaps less suffering in the future.

Council has been busy working throughout the summer months and I include below a few highlights:

- Council welcomed three new members: Tom Armstrong, Kim Boucher and Eric Strong. Welcome and thank you!
- We have had a number of safety and sanitation concerns about folks camping on the UUSB campus. Working in conjunction with the Buildings & Grounds Committee, Council adopted a policy to address these concerns. The policy is included in full immediately following the Council Crier.
- Council was delighted with Erin Seavey's efforts in developing some colorful new UUSB items that will be available for purchase this fall. The catalog of options include not only t-shirts and sweatshirts, but also winter hats, reusable shopping totes, canvas boat totes, baseball caps, and can coozies, all imprinted with a wonderful design developed by Kaz. UUSB Camping Policy

Purpose. The purpose of this policy is to provide a compassionate and welcoming response to individuals in need while also being mindful of the risks presented by camping in the absence of adequate resources. Overnight camping without adequate services such as sewer, water, and garbage presents a health and safety concern. Unless or until there are resources to provide such services in a regulated manner, overnight camping is not an available option. This policy is not meant to exclude any individual seeking access to a UUSB program, service, or temporary respite on church grounds. All are welcome.

Overnight Camping Prohibited. Use or occupancy of the grounds of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Bangor (UUSB) at 120 Park Street, Bangor, Maine for purposes of overnight habitation is prohibited. Occupancy for the purpose of habitation is evidenced by the use of camping equipment including but not limited to tents, tarpaulins, temporary shelters, bedding (e.g., sleeping bags), cooking facilities, and related paraphernalia.

Notice. Appropriate signage regarding the camping prohibition shall be posted in appropriate areas on the UUSB grounds, together with information regarding resources, including UUSB events and resources, for those in need.

Procedure. If the UUSB becomes aware of an individual using or seeking to use the grounds of the UUSB for purposes of habitation (a "camper"), the following actions may be taken:

1.During normal business hours (Monday- Friday, 8 am - 5 pm), a representative of the UUSB may (but is not required to) advise the camper of UUSB policy and provide information regarding relevant resources. Alternatively, the representative of the UUSB may inform a member of the UUSB Council of the presence of a camper on the grounds.

Upon being notified of the presence of a camper on UUSB grounds, members of the Council shall inform the Council Chair. The Chair or the Chair's designee shall contact a representative of Projects for Assistance with Transition from Homelessness (PATH), a program overseen by Community Health & Counseling Services (CHCS), located at 42 Cedar Street, Bangor, Maine. The Council Chair shall request that PATH assist the camper in accessing appropriate resources and shall follow up as needed to determine that successful engagement with the camper has been made.

3.If the camper has not quit the UUSB grounds or made concrete plans to do so within 24 hours of initial contact with a representative of PATH, the Council Chair or designee may seek intervention by the Bangor Community Action Team (BCAT) or the Bangor Police Department (BPD).

Immediate Action Authorized. If any individual, including a camper, engages in any violent, abusive, disruptive, offensive, or illegal activity on UUSB grounds, the Council Chair or designee is authorized to take any necessary and immediate action for the removal of such individual from UUSB property.

SHARE THE PLATE



Every Sunday, we share half of our undesignated plate offerings with an organization that works toward our UU values. In September, half of the undesignated funds in the plate will go to Partners for Peace. Partners for Peace works to end domestic violence in Penobscot and Piscataquis Counties. They provide support, advocacy, and safety planning to anyone affected by

domestic abuse. They foster safe and healthy relationships through prevention, education, and training. Together with our community, they recognize the nature of abuse, respond to it, and change the conditions which lead to it.

In May, we shared \$323 with Partners for Peace! In June, we shared the plate with the UUSB Food Programs! In July, we shared \$244 with the Wilson Center!



SOCIAL JUSTICE

JUSTICE NOW!

UUSB's Justice Now group will shortly be gearing up for our new church year! Despite the fact that we had no Justice Now official meeting in August, there has been growing activity behind the scenes, including our work with other allies also doing justice work. Certainly our primary focus for the rest of the fall will be working on getting out the vote (GOTV) with MUUSAN (Maine Unitarian Universalist State Advocacy Network), and the League of Women Voters Maine.

Our next meeting with MUUSAN will be via Zoom, on Saturday, September 7 in the Community Café, from 10:30 to 12:00. We will be watching a brief video at 10:15, about UU's national "UU the Vote" effort, so don't be late! People are also encouraged to check out the new League of Women Voters Maine voting guide, on the Justice Now table.

Last but not least, Justice Now is continuing our work with food justice and other local justice needs, especially through UUSB's membership in Faith Linking in Action (FLIA). Suzanne Kelly, who is currently chair of FLIA and their Food Justice issue group, recently reported that the City of Bangor's Public Health & Community Service Dept. is awarding FLIA an Outstanding Stars Award for its food calendar project. The calendars appear on Faith Linking in Action's webpage (www.faithlinkinginaction.org) and are kept up to date on a quarterly basis so people who need the information can trust its accuracy. The most up to date calendars (one for pantries and one for meals) can also be accessed by a QR code on a card a person can carry with them or where calendars are displayed in the community.



Second Sunday Food Collection

On **Sunday, September 8**, UUSB will once again host our Second Sunday Food Drive, the church's monthly community food collection. This month, we will begin collecting food during the service, instead of after the service.

In FY2024, we donated 1,242 pounds of food!

The food collected is given to the Ecumenical Food Pantry in Bangor. They can also take monetary donations, which buys up to six pounds of food for every dollar given. Make checks out to Bangor Ecumenical Food Cupboard (Bangor EFC).

If you aren't sure what to give, they are always looking for cereal, canned fruit, canned baked beans, pasta, and sauce!




SOCIAL JUSTICE

Showing Up for Racial Equity (S.U.R.E.)

SURE (Showing Up for Racial Equity) will begin our church year on September 1st after the service at 11:30 am in the Community Cafe. We will be watching the panel discussion from the Confronting White Grievance Symposium. It is quite powerful and has lots of information you may not have considered before. Become better informed on White Grievance, attend this meeting with us! All are welcome.

We will also be discussing our next steps for the upcoming year. Things we will discuss could include

- Reading <u>"The Talk,"</u> by Darrin Bell, a graphic novel about what families of color have to do to prepare their children for the dangers they may have to face in the world.
- The 2024-25 UUA Common Read: <u>"Authentic Selves: Celebrating Trans and Nonbinary People</u> and Their Families". More information will be available a little later in the Fall.
- Watch and discuss "God and Country." This documentary looks at the implications of Christian Nationalism and how it distorts not only the constitutional republic, but Christianity itself. We might choose to do this on an evening or Saturday morning when there is more time to watch and discuss. It is a very powerful movie!'
- Other ideas from our membership on things to do/watch/discuss.

To purchase your Hannaford card and support UUSB, please purchase after the Sunday service or contact Rosemary.




