## **DREW'S VIEWS**

Greetings Dear Ones,

This month, our Soul Matters theme is the Practice of Inclusion. The concept of Inclusion means different things to different people in various situations. Try as we might, even the most conscientious person or group may not always be as inclusive as they wish to be. This is because Inclusion involves an intimacy and connection between people which takes or groups, thoughtful effort. All our UU principles embrace Inclusion: Interdependence, Pluralism, Justice, Equity, Transformation, and Generosity.

Inclusion requires a dynamic balance of these values to thrive. First, it takes the openness of a group to welcome new including participants, them in established practices and welcoming their ideas. It also means we must welcome them without requiring full assimilation or erasure of their culture. Secondly, the party joining a new group needs a sense of safety and a genuine feeling that they matter and are valued and respected. If those conditions are met, Inclusion is evident as people on all sides are transformed by their new community members.

This process can be awkward. It requires trust and willingness to listen, an ability to articulate wants, needs, and desires clearly, and the ability to respond in kind and generous ways. For taskoriented people, Inclusion can be difficult and frustrating, because the fruits and rewards of Inclusion are not

immediately noticeable always or measurable. Inclusion is a spiritual, mental, and organizational infrastructure might not that reap immediate rewards, but provides lasting achieved dividends when and maintained.

One of the reasons I was drawn to my current spiritual practice of Insight, or Vipassana meditation, is that it helps one develop the skill of "allowing" or including distracting thoughts and emotions as they arise. When distracting thoughts arrive, the practice is to accept them—notice them and not judge them.

Doing so cultivates what is called "kind awareness"—an awareness that allows us to treat even uncomfortable feelings and emotions respectfully and examine them in a way that leads to deeper understanding of their nature and origin. Being able to sit with and examine those thoughts and emotions helps us cultivate thoughtful responses, instead of quick and hasty reactions.

While I don't know this for certain I can't help but wonder if this is how many indigenous cultures have been able to survive for tens of thousands of years by listening, and noticing their natural

Inclusion. A concept that is so desperately needed in our world today – from immigration reform, to dismantling forms of oppression and learning to build a beloved community – the process of inclusion is so important and yet illusive.

May we all take moments to reflect on how open we are to hearing thoughts, and ideas that feel uncomfortable to us, so, we can be present to those experiences as we look for wise ways to engage in responding thoughtfully with openness and love, instead of reacting out of fear and hate.

## MAKE A PAPER HEART TO SHARE

One way to make someone feel welcome (and *included*) is to give a gift. In the spirit of welcoming others and February's most famous holiday, here are some instructions for making an origami heart. Make one to share with someone this month!

Step 1: Fold your square in half two times and unfold. You should see a "t".



Step 3: Fold the bottom corner up to reach the fold line from Step 2.



Step 5: Flip your heart over. Fold the top two points down at the half-way mark and tuck them in.



Step 2: Fold down the top corner so the point touches the center



Step 4: Fold both sides in from the bottom to meet at the center.



Step 6: Fold the points on both sides in.
