DREW'S VIEWS

Greetings Dear Ones,

One of the primary questions people ask when discussing spirituality and faith is, "In what do we trust?" This is a powerful question because trust is the fundamental building block upon which we build our lives and relationships.

When our sense of trust in something is broad and solid, like a pyramid, we can grow, build great things, and go far. Knowing that there is a solid foundation allows us to engage the world with an openness to diversity, a willingness to take risks, and a vision open to change. When we don't have a solid foundation of trust, we often become nervous, anxious, and fearful of change. When we are agitated in this way, our ability to trust is severely diminished as we doubt or question the solidity of our mental, physical, and spiritual foundations.

When the flight, flight, and freeze response is triggered, the oldest part of our brain immediately shifts into survival mode. In survival mode, we are separated from our higher-level brain function, including creativity, more indepth assessment, and mindful and thoughtful responses necessary for high-level functioning and growth.

Today, we live in very stressful times. In country, executive orders challenging many of the foundations of our societal order, and unelected officials are challenging the core of our higher-level democratic system. We feel that many of our UU values are under attack, including the system of democracy and the many checks and balances that we have relied on to bring about inclusive processes that lead to thoughtful change.

So, it is ironic and inconvenient that, at the same time, the foundation of trust in our social democratic process is under attack, and we are looking at some change in our congregation, too. This month, we are hiring a new Acting Coordinator for our Spiritual Exploration program. We are also looking at our fiscal year 2026 financial stewardship program - the results of which might alter our programming for next year. In addition, we are looking at a significant presented by Needlepoint Sanctuary (NPS) to expand their Lifesaving harm reduction work by utilizing our Dorthy Memorial fellowship space to provide a needle exchange and other harm reduction services.

The last of these two changes comes with some emotional charge. They can trigger feelings that lead to doubt or dis-ease by association. The important thing is to continue to engage in our respective spiritual practices that ground us and remind us that our UU and UUSB values and covenant will

Dear UUSB Community,

Christine gave me an extension beyond the usual C&C deadline (thank you Christine!), so I am able to write this following our meeting to discuss a proposal from Needle Point Sanctuary. Thank you to everyone who participated and to those who have shared their thoughts following the meeting. Council is listening.

Council continued discussions with The Solar Committee. Joe Z reported that there do not appear to be any grant options available that might offset the costs of the UUSB solar initiative. There is a proposal to finance the project through a loan through our line of credit at Morgan Stanley, secured by the UUSB General Endowment, in combination with a targeted fund-raising campaign. Several Council members expressed concerns about assuming this financial debt responsibility now; recognizing UUSB's already precarious finances.

Needlepoint Sanctuary (NPS) has presented a proposal to provide a safe needle exchange program at UUSB. Council members felt this was a decision upon which wider community input was needed. We had a meeting with the larger UUSB community on February 23. A panel of NPS staff, a CDC representative and Council members were present to answer questions and respond to concerns.

Exciting news from the SEE Team... but I will leave it to them to fill you in!

A generous donor has provided funding to upgrade our sound system. Additionally, Council approved funding to update our antiquated hearing assistance devices. With these improvements it is hoped that everyone in our sanctuary will be able to fully hear and participate in our services.

Our Stewardship Campaign coincides with developing a proposed budget for the next fiscal year. Council has been reviewing the budget for the past several months and there is no glossing over the fact that UUSB's financial status is precarious. Our financial stability relies on successful pledge campaigns, facility rentals and fundraising efforts.

The living tradition of Unitarian Universalism has changed in many ways from its historical Christian roots. As many of you recall, last year at General Assembly UUs "adopted new language to describe who we are as UUs". UUs voted to adopt language that describes Unitarian Universalism through our shared values centered around love. (www.uua.org/beliefs/shared-values) At our annual meeting UUSB will decide whether or not to replace the current language in our By-laws with the new UUA Bylaw language. Please keep an eye out in future newsletters for further information.

Lastly, once again, a message of gratitude and thanks for our Beloved UUSB Community. Council is grateful for everyone for pitching in, in whatever way you have done; from participating in Fellowship Hour, helping with a clean up day, working on a fundraiser, participating in a committee, greeting a visitor, smiling as you pass in the hallway or for simply showing up and being with us.



Mindfulness Meditation Group

This meditation group is accessible to meditators of all experience levels, including people new to meditation. The program consists of walking and sitting meditation and a Dharma lesson with group discussion. The group intends to meet in a supportive, friendly, and non-judgmental environment. Each session is self-contained

material-wise. Regular attendance is helpful though optional. We will continue to explore the topic of Anger using a book titled *Anger* by Thich Nhat Hahn.

Drop-ins are always welcome. **We encourage newcomers to arrive or sign in fifteen minutes early (at 5:30 PM)** so they can get a short briefing and introduction to our group process and a quick introduction to insight meditation, especially if they are not experienced meditators or haven't meditated for a while.

Regular group meditation begins promptly at 5:45 PM.

Saving Our Democracy

Even with the miserable weather on December 8th we managed to collect 129.5 pounds of food! Our grand total for 2024 was 1,552 pounds.
