DREW'S VIEWS

Dear Ones,

In the story of creation from the Torah, God rests after six days of creating the world. Spirit (or God) rests, then reflects on what they made and concludes that 'what had been created was good.' Regardless of our perspectives on the Origin story of the universe, I think this passage is perhaps one that is most revealing about our human condition and our anthropomorphizing of the creator Spirit into human terms.

Like the creator Spirit, we need time away from our everyday toils and efforts to relax and renew our Spirit and souls. In the Abrahamic religious traditions (Judaism, Christianity, and Islam), this time concept is a sabbath - a day set aside to reflect on work, efforts, and journeys and to rest. In today's society of 24/7 engagement, the world does not shut off. Instead, we are encouraged to keep up with the grinding pace of life without a break. We delude ourselves into thinking this is sustainable even though it flies in the face of ancient wisdom that people, just like God(s), need space for rest and renewal.

Like many of you, I find making space to rest and reflection hard to fit into my schedule. My sabbath day (Mondays) often becomes filled with other events and personal business. Sometimes, my sabbath day is the only time I seem to have to do my laundry, go shopping for

groceries, pay my bills, or do my housekeeping. Completing these tasks is rewarding, AND they are not the same as a sabbath, which is a day of rest.

In more conservative Jewish households, the Torah's interpretation is clear—one does not work on the Sabbath day. Practitioners are expected to refrain from cooking, driving, working, using technology, or even using electricity. Wise rabbis and Jewish teachers seem to know how tempting it is to try to squeeze one more bit of work into our sacred renewal time.

True sabbath time takes some planning and discipline. It's hard to relax and pause especially when we know we have so much more work to do. Yet when we do we are gifted a true space for renewal – a true gift of Divinity.

I am sometimes asked if sabbath is the same of spiritual practice. While spiritual practice does offer some wonder Spiritually renewing rewards it not the same. Spiritual practice still requires effort – sometimes it's peaceful and sometimes not so peaceful – still

spiritual practice is not the same as unscripted rest where renewal just happens without effort or deliberation.

As we head into the this time of late spring, verging on summer we are inspired by the beauty of nature renewing itself in colorful blossoms and greenery. It's important that all this beauty because the earth has rested and then slowly awakened. Without the rest this new growth would not be possible. The temptation for us is in this time of transition and change of season is to fill our open space with preparing for the next thing or event in our lives. If we are wise, we will listen to Mother

nature and those wise rabbi's and spiritual teachers and set aside for rest and reflection so our being can be renewed and we can feel those feelings that all we do – all the effort we put forth in living lives of truth and meaning is good. May we all experience those moments of satisfaction and equanimity as we make space for sabbath – the mysterious process rest and renewal.



TREASURER'S REPORT APR. 2024

This report covers 83% of the year.

Total income for the month of April was \$23,639. Year to Date income is \$223,272, 85.8% of the year's budget In April 2023, income was \$32,185. Last year's YTD income was \$207,937, 84.8% of the year's budget.


Expenses were \$21,028, giving us a gain of \$2,611 for the month. YTD expenses were \$217,257, 83.5% of the budget. In April 2023, expenses were \$21,761 and that year's YTD expenses were \$209,292, 85.2% of the budget.

April 2024 income included pledge of \$8,386. Plate donations were \$722. Half the plate was sent to Faith Linking in Action (FLIA), a Bangor area interfaith group. Endowments were \$3,004. Rental income was \$650. Auction income was \$9,781. General Fund was \$195.

VANCO: In April, 15 people used the Vanco link to make payments totaling \$3,668.18 gross in all categories with a net of \$3,570.17. Fees were \$73.75 and the offset paid was \$82.18. Additional charges invoiced were \$24.26, which includes the monthly fee of \$10 for the site. Donations were: General Fund for \$45; Pledges for \$1,541; Share the Plate for \$120; and Auction for \$1,880.

Expenses for the month break down as Personnel \$13,714 (65% of total costs), Building \$3,496 (17%), Fair Share to the UUA \$869 (4%), Administrative \$1,052 (5%), and Congregational expenses for \$1,897 (9%). Total expenses for 10 months was \$217,257, 85.5% of the year's budget.

The Auction was a huge success, bringing in \$3,000 more than budgeted. Statements of pledge status will be sent out in early June. Please check and be sure to be up to date. Automatic checks from your bank, or scheduled Vanco payments relieve you of having to remember to make a monthly payment. You can also have direct deductions taken from your pay check.

Building Access: Codes & Fobs

There have been some recent issues with security codes and the alarms going off. I am aware of the issue and working on correcting the code list with Central Security. But, all black security fobs should be working as normal. If you don't already have a black fob for the alarm, contact the office to get one set up.

For those who are new to the black security fobs, they are easy to use, even easier than the old security codes. To use the black fobs, you simply tap the fob to the two circles that look like a target. This works to disarm the system on entry and to arm it when you exit.

GIFT CARD FUNDRAISER


