PHISHING & SCAM EMAILS

You may have received emails in the past that claim to be from a member of the UUSB staff or Council, but something seemed a bit odd about them. Perhaps it was an unusual greeting (like "Rev. Drew" closing with "Blessings in Christ") or maybe it was asking for money or maybe it asked you to send them a copy of the UUSB Directory.

You aren't the only one! These are phishing and scam emails. Unfortunately, it is common for scammers to go to church websites and take the public info to try and steal information from unsuspecting congregants.

But, the solution is simple! Remember these simple steps:

- 1) Check the email address or phone number. If it doesn't match, it's a scam.
- 2) UUSB staff will never solicit gift cards or money by text or email, unless through official channels.
- 3) Do not share the Directory. All access has to go through the UUSB office, so anyone looking for a copy can email uubangor@gmail.com.

DREW'S VIEWS

Greetings Dear Beloveds,

Our spiritual theme this month is "Cultivating Compassion." I like this theme because it rightly implies that compassion is more than an innate trait or state of being. Instead, it's a skill anyone can develop with great care and attention.

Just like with any skill or talent, everyone is born with a differing degree of the natural skill of compassion. Yet with attention, concentration, and practice, the skill of compassion can be learned by everyone. It can be developed and grown into a means of embracing ourselves, the world, and each other with kindness and love. It's a skill that is both nurturing to the practitioner and receiver.

Several years ago one of my teachers delved into an exploration of the difference between empathy (the ability to understand and share the feelings of another), and compassion which author Sharon Salzberg describes as, "..a strong, active heart that responds to suffering, without fear or judgment, emphasizing not its weakness, but a powerful force for change, rooted in wisdom, and the understanding of our interconnectedness."

I like this image of a soft yet strong heart that does not react to suffering, but accepts it, is flexible with it, and seeks to understand it. All while not judging it. Instead, the wise and skilled compassion practitioner sees suffering

as a teacher, prophet, or guide. Often suffering is something we think of as creating separation, but Salzberg's definition helps us see that compassion is a source of understanding, knowing, and building interconnection.

Sounds easy, right? Not really! Everyone who has loved someone and/or interacted with another has experienced suffering, whether you loved them or not. The Buddha teaches us that the world is naturally filled with suffering, yet through compassion and understanding, we can develop the skills to free ourselves from suffering and live engaged lives of meaning and care by not becoming slaves to that suffering.

In our current societal paradigm, I believe that learning compassion is perhaps one of the best paths out of the hatred and division that is separating our nation from its wiser and informed self.

The other thing I like about compassion is that it embraces all our UU Values: Love, Interdependence, Pluralism, Justice, Transformation, Generosity, and Equity. Compassion incorporates all these values and more. The challenge for us as Unitarian Universalists is how to cultivate compassion.

Most religions offer a prescription on how to build a compassionate way of being – in Buddhism, there are the Brahma Vihara meditation practices (Loving-Kindness, Compassion, Sympathetic Joy and Equanimity), in Christianity, the Rosary or prayer attributed to St Francis (Lord, make me an instrument of thy peace...), In Islam,

through the pillars of Zakat (almsgiving) and Hajj (pilgrimage), and in Judaism, the practice of Tikkum Olam (repair of the world) is practiced.

One of the things that makes Unitarian Universalism different is that we leave the "how to" of cultivating spiritual skills like compassion up to the individual. For some, we look to spiritual practices from other religious traditions to develop those skills. Others grow through human connections, like working on bean suppers, working to end hunger, or going out and regularly embracing the natural world.

The temptation is to let these learning opportunities be casual and unfold as they will. One of the things that I have valued about my 15 years of meditation practice is that when I look back at where I started, I notice that I have

grown. I notice that my capacity for compassion has grown because of engaging in the effort of regular practice. I am not a Boddhisatva, yet my capacity to be kind, loving, and compassionate has grown greatly. That is what that continued effort is all about.

May you all actively cultivate and expand your own capacity of compassion. It's something that the world needs more of – now more than ever (along with LOVE).

May you and all beings be well, safe, and happy in the coming days as we navigate these times together.

Dear UUSB Community,

I listen to the Coyotes chatting in our yard, later waking to a foggy morning while thinking about safety and what that means and what that feels like for me, for our community and for the wider community in which we live. I feel safe around Coyotes. Around my fellow human beings.... that is not so straightforward for me.

For many, myself included, our sense of safety has shifted since that fateful moment on January 6th when terrorists violently attempted to overthrow our government. I think of how safe I feel in the forests and meadows where I walk each morning and how much more alert I become in crowds of people. This new reality is challenging and this month Council adopted measures that will, hopefully, help more of us feel safer.

Council welcomed Linda Sisson from the Membership Fellowship Committee to discuss the proposed Safer Community Guidelines. Council unanimously approved them. Please find the guidelines in this month's Chalice & Chimes.

Zach provided an update on the Solar Project, which continues to be skillfully managed by Mark McCollough. Conversations with Versant continue moving the project forward. Mark's presentation of the project to the Historic Preservation Committee was well received. Discussions continue around the next steps to take to begin fundraising for the project. Another HUGE thank you Mark!

The Personnel Committee, in conjunction with UUSB Staff, continue their work to develop protocols for administrative coverage during staff absences.

Tracy updated Council on the Creativity Matters small group adult spiritual exploration experience that begins in October. Creativity Matters is an opportunity for our UUSB community to more deeply explore our monthly worship themes. The group- Creativity Matters- will meet in person on October 19 from 11:30 to 12:30 and following that the group will meet monthly via ZOOM. Facilitators Phyllis Havens and Tracy Haskell encourage all interested to accept their invitation to let your right brain dance with your left brain! See more information in Chalice & Chimes.

SAFER COMMUNITY GUIDELINES

Dear UUSB Members and Friends,

During the past months members of the Membership Fellowship Committee and the Safer Congregation Committee have been engaged in a significant and meaningful process to develop guidelines that will assist our members and our friends in ensuring UUSB is both a place of safety and welcome.

Council recognizes that our UUSB community has been faced with an increase in safety concerns, and while no policy or knowledge of the issues can absolutely guarantee safety in our congregation under all circumstances, together we can take pro-active steps to create an environment that is safe and prepared.

Ensuring we remain both a welcoming community and a safe community in which we worship, Council approved the following guidelines at our September 17, 2025 meeting.

The Safer Congregation committee members are Rev. Drew, Connie McVey, Chuck McKay, Carol Veits and Tracy Haskell.

Membership Fellowship committee members are Linda Sisson, Cathy Elliott, Evan Richert, Joan Richert, Eleanor Steele and Kim Boucher.

By working and assuming a shared responsibility, together we will ensure UUSB remains a safe and sacred sanctuary for all. Please reach out to our Office Administrator Christine Sprague, our Minister Rev. Drew Moeller or our Council Chair Zach Falcon if you have any safety concerns.

Safer Community Guidelines

- 1. No public use of bathrooms for those not attending our Sunday morning programs. Only those participating in our events and services can use our bathrooms. When someone presents Sunday morning asking to use the bathroom, kindly tell them that we do not have public bathrooms. Do not ask them right then if they plan on attending the service. If they were planning on attending the service, they would say so first.
- 2. We plan on making a small handout with map and locations of nearby public bathrooms, nearby food pantries, bean supper info, to hand out to those requesting use of bathrooms and not attending Sunday morning programs.

- 3. If a person presents asking for Willie or Needlepoint Sanctuary, let them know that he doesn't work here on Sundays, that he works here on Mondays and Tuesdays and they can come back then. Willie told us that we can give anyone his phone number, so ask if they want his phone number and give if asked (207-631-9311). Plan is to have his name and # on the small handout referenced above, that has other resources on it.
- 4. If a person presents on a Sunday saying they are hungry, ask them to wait outside, and if possible, make them or ask another church member to make them, a paper plate full or a baggie of snacks from our fellowship hour offerings. Give them the slip of paper with food pantry info.
- 5. Narcan is in the kitchen, the 1st cabinet on the left, marked First Aid. We plan to offer regular Narcan trainings, one was held this summer and more will be offered. We encourage MF greeters to consider attending a Narcan training, as well as any UUSB member or friend.
- 6. Reminder that only the upper church door is open on Sundays. The lower and middle church doors are locked throughout Sunday. During the SEE year, once a month the lower door is open for a short time 1–2 hours prior to the service as SEAL members enter for their committee meeting, but that door is closely monitored during that short time.
- 7. If a person who is unknown to a greeter presents to a Sunday service and the person is seen leaving the service before it is over, the greeter should go out with that person and kindly ask them if they need anything. If they are going to the bathroom, show them to the bathroom. Wait for them to exit the bathroom and accompany them back into the sanctuary. If they ask, you can let them know this is one of your roles as a greeter. If the greeter feels at all uncomfortable, please ask another greeter or church member, to accompany them during this time.
- 8. In the hopefully rare chance that an unknown person who is not a UUSB program participant does end up using one of our bathrooms for an extended period of time, here are some guidelines to be considered. Willie from Needlepoint told us he has a 10 minute rule for bathroom use whenever he has guests in his programming, because of the potential for someone to overdose in that time. Proposal to be considered by council: If a non church goer person unknown to us is known to be in a bathroom for more than 10 minutes, knock on the door and ask if they are ok. If they don't answer, or if they don't give an answer that indicates they will be right out, get another greeter AND church council member or if needed another church member. With them, knock on the door again, say you are concerned, that they need to come out right now for safety reasons. If they still don't come out, tell them that due to safety protocol, you will use the master key to open their door or will call 911. Assess situation. You may decide to open the door (the new door knobs can easily be opened by just pushing in its center button—no key needed) or call 911 instead or in addition, as needed.

9. Safety concern regarding when non church goers come into the building after the service has concluded to use the bathroom or come to fellowship hour. One step that already has been taken, and should continue, is to keep the main door of the Dorothy locked. However, non church goers sometimes enter as people are exiting the Dorothy. Proposal is for a MF greeter to ask the person if they are here for the service. If they say yes, then tell them that it has already ended, that they hope they will come back next Sunday at 10 am and gently escort them towards the door. If they say they are not here for the service, then proceed with guidelines 1-4 stated above. An additional idea proposed by MF is to make an announcement at church and/or write in the order of service, periodically, to ask people to please not let in non church goers into the building as they exit after the service, per our safety guidelines. And if someone does notice a non church goer coming in as another exited, to alert a MF or council member.

Expenses were \$14,828. Leaving us with a net income of \$2,751. for the month. YTD expenses are \$31,354, 11% of the budget.

August 2025 income included pledges in the amount of \$11,650. YTD pledge amount is \$61,272.

Our Share the Plate donations for August was \$456. Rental income was \$1,372. There has not yet been a lot of fundraising activity for this report, but our Grocery Card sales were \$561 for the month, and \$228 in UUSB Food Program Donations.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

Justice Now

For several weeks now, the residents and streets of Bangor have continued to join together in vigils and actions, every Tuesday. Many Bangor members of UUSB are now among those who walk or bike or drive to the center of the city. Every week, once a week, people are taking their places in front of the Bangor Federal Building, carrying signs of protest, stating their resistance to those who would become kings if they were successful. Come together! People begin to show up aroundll a.m.; and stay until 1 p.m. If they can. Passing cars and trucks honk their approval, while a smaller number are not so friendly, but so what!

People are still arriving from the streets nearby. Signs up and down Harlow Street, in front of the federal building. What do we want? We call out chants. We want democracy, we demand an end to war, calling out our determination.

What do we want? We want peace and food to eat. And we ask others in our church, how can we explore next steps? How can we do justice work?

We are working together in people's homes, and with others, insisting, resisting – with other groups, like Faith Linking in Action, Indivisible, churches, labor unions. And we find our selves once again in the streets, calling for change, demanding change.

We weep with those who have been taken, with no warning. We share their grief and rage as human beings are snatched from their homes and job and cars and buses.

UUSB is among these resisters, insisting on peace, coming again and again to downtown Bangor, calling out their determination.

Please come join us! There is so much to do. Making new signs every week. Singing a Leonard Cohen song about democracy, marching in a circle. Making postcards to urge peace. Hugging a friend, still carrying the same signs, holding new signs, protecting ourselves.

Come to our Justice Now Meeting on September 21, after church, at 11:30 a.m., as we explore other possibilities in changing the world. So many of us are showing up at the Federal Building. Come, we need you and need your energy and determination, we need everyone. We are continuing, and we will not give up.



The Malaga Ship: A Story of Maine and the Middle Passage - Sunday, October 5 @3:00

On Sunday, October 5, we are excited to be bringing Antonio Rocha's performance of *The Malaga Ship: A Story of Maine and the Middle Passage* to Bangor! By following the link, you can find out so much more. Here's a nutshell: The Malaga Ship Story is a tour de force performance. Using his entire body and voice, Antonio sings, narrates, and mimes his way through this poetically toned historical tale told mostly from the perspective of the ship. The story vividly explores the reality and impact of the slave industry, which was the largest industry in the world in the 1800s. The story also has a deep connection to the performer, for Malaga goes to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil in 1845, where Antonio was raised in a biracial household over a century later. The story even originates in Maine!



We are so excited to be the first to bring this performance to the Bangor area. Antonio has been around the world with this and other creative performances. He's a force! We are co-sponsoring the Malaga Ship with the Greater Bangor area NAACP, FLIA (Faith Linking in Action), The Wilson Center at UMaine, and David Patrick. There is a sliding scale cost of \$12 to \$35 (pay what you can) and if cost is prohibitive, talk to Laurie Cartier about a scholarship. We won't turn anyone away, but we do have to pay the performer! There will also be tickets at the door.

This event will start at 3 pm. The performance is 45 minutes and then there will be about 30 minutes for a Q&A session. If you can help with adding some refreshments for after the performance, let Laurie know. This is going to be something you won't want to miss! It's not for children under 12 as it's pretty intense, but childcare will be provided in the Dorothy Memorial Hall by members of the NAACP.

We began donating to Good Shepherd Food Bank in July 2025, after we stopped donating to the Salvation Army. We used to donate to the Salvation Army monthly, after we had to stop serving lunch at our local branch in 2020. After concerns about the Salvation Army's views on LGBTQ+ people were raised, it was decided that we would find a different, similar organization. Good Shepherd Food Bank of Maine was selected as a local-to-Maine option with shared values to feed those in need and working toward a greener world.
